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Leo Endel announces June 30 retirement

Rochester, Minn. – Leo Endel, executive director of the Minnesota-Wisconsin Baptist Convention since 2002, announced that he will retire June 30, 2025.

Endel made the announcement to the MWBC executive board on Friday, Sept. 13, as they met at Emmanuel Baptist Church in Rochester, Minn. He said the ten-month notice was being given because "there are things we need to do

to plan this transtion so that your next executive director might have a smooth and effective beginning."

The morning following Endel's retirement announcement, the executive board elected a search committee to be chaired by Steve Melvin, who retired from MWBC in 2018 after serving 20 years as the convention's church starting catalyst. Hoyt Lovelace, pastor of missions of Resonate Church in Janesville, Wis., will serve as vice chairman. Also on the search committee are Bob Ray, pastor, East Madison Baptist Church, Madison, Wis.; Les Stevens, pastor, Chester Woods Community Church, Rochester, Minn.; Paul Fries, retired

Plan now for MWBC annual meeting

Appleton, Wis. – Time is running out for electing messengers and making hotel reservations for the Minnesota-Wisconsin Baptist Convention annual meeting, scheduled Oct. 25-26 at Valley Baptist

Church in Appleton, Wis.

The annual meeting begins at 1 p.m., Friday and ends at noon, Saturday.

The meeting will be preceded by a 9-11:30 a.m. Friday pastors' conference at the

The executive board also accepted Endel's recommendation that Mark Elliott, retired associational mission strategist for the Heartland Church Network in Omaha, Neb., be brought in as a consultant to help orient and assist the new search committee.

They agreed to work toward electing the next executive director at the Apr. 25-26, 2025 executive board meeting. That would provide about a month of leadership overlap so that Endel could

assist his successor by orienting him to his new task.

Endel left an 11-year pastorate at Southern Hills Baptist Church in Sioux City, Iowa, to become MWBC's executive director on May 6, 2002. He is the convention's third executive director. Otha Winningham, who had led the M-W Fellowship since 1975, became the first executive director when the convention was founded in 1983. Winningham retired in 1993 and was succeeded by Bill Tinsley who served until June 30, 2001.

In other action, the executive board approved a "Resolution on the Centennial Anniversary of the SBC Cooperative Program," which affirms the Cooperative Program as "our primary method of funding our Great Commission cooperation at home and abroad." The resolution will be offered at the MWBC annual meeting for consideration by the messengers. The full text of the resolution is printed here.

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Resolution on the Centennial Anniversary of the SBC Cooperative Program

WHEREAS, In 2025 Southern Baptists will celebrate the centennial anniversary of our Cooperative Program; and

WHEREAS, Upon the establishment of the Cooperative Program, M.E. Dodd, Chairman of the Commission on the Future Program, exhorted Southern Baptists toward "a unity of purpose and consecration never known before;" and

WHEREAS, Since 1925 the Cooperative Program has provided a comprehensive funding mechanism for like-minded Baptist churches to support missions in all the world, all the time, at the same time (Matthew 28:18-20, Acts 1:8); and

WHEREAS, The biblical doctrine of cooperation compels us to work together and thereby effect a greater reward for our efforts (Ecclesiastes 4:9-12); and

WHEREAS, During these past 41 years, Minnesota-Wisconsin Baptists have contributed \$17.3 million through the Cooperative Program to fund missionaries, disaster relief efforts, church planting, church revitalization, chaplaincies, evangelistic initiatives, discipleship strategies, pastor care, Christian education, Baptist communications, human needs ministries, and more; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota-Wisconsin Baptists have made a great commitment to our missionaries, both at home and abroad, and to our larger family of Baptist workers whose Great Commission efforts are supported and sustained through Cooperative Program giving; and

WHEREAS, Article IV of the Minnesota-Wisconsin Baptist Convention constitution states that, along with cooperative participation, "financial contribution through the Cooperative Program" is evidence that a church is "in harmony with the work and purpose of the Convention;"

RESOLVED, That the messengers to the Minnesota-Wisconsin Baptist Convention meeting in Appleton, Wis., Oct. 25-26, 2024, affirm the Cooperative Program as our primary method of funding our Great Commission cooperation at home and abroad; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we ascribe thanksgiving and glory to God for blessing the partnership in the gospel we have known through Cooperative Program giving for one-hundred years (Philippians 1:3-5); and be it further



Our bylaws note that the officers of the convention nominate the search committee. Last week I met with President Daniel Goba. First Vice-President Chris Philips, Second Vice-President Joseph

Young, and Recording Secretary Tim Amert. We prayed, collaborated, and drafted the first recommendations regarding this process. These recommendations were presented to the executive board on Friday night, Sept. 13.

Your officers recommended a nine-person search committee be established that represents the diversity of our convention. Article 4 of the MWBC constitution states that any active member in a cooperating MWBC church is eligible to serve. They considered active and past convention officers, pastors, and leaders with a track record of serving and supporting the work of the convention through personal involvement and giving. They nominated nine individuals

and three alternates that were presented to the board on Friday night. On Saturday morning the board was allowed to discuss and alter the nominations presented and then a final list was approved by the full executive board on Saturday morning. That list is in the front page article about my retirement.

Further, the officers recommended to the executive board that we secure Mark Elliott, retired associational mission strategist for the Heartland Church Network (Omaha, Neb.) to be brought in as a consultant to help orient and assist the new search committee.

For obvious reasons. I will not oversee nor will I try to influence this process, but I am willing to resource

the committee at their request. I believe we have gifted and capable leaders within our network of churches, and I plan to recommend that they consider four men whom I believe are uniquely prepared to take on this role. Perhaps God would lead you to call one of these leaders; they already know our diversity and our heartbeat. However, I anticipate that your search committee will also look beyond these men to do a broader search. I am confident that God will lead them to His chosen and prepared leader.

I hope that the executive board will be able to prayerfully seek, find, and then elect the next executive director at the Apr.


You are better than you think

my hands, looked into his eyes and said, "You are better than you think you are." By the end of the day he was riding wherever he wanted to ride. When he demonstrated his newfound skill to his parents they were thrilled. He said, "Tomorrow, you can buy me my own bike!" They did.

p.m. Friday; 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, and 1-3:30 p.m., Sunday.

led by Cheryl Tarr, a National Literacy Missions Partnership (NLMP) trainer. NLMP is an organization of Southern

Baptist state conventions that freely cooperate to support literacy ministries. They work closely with NAMB and Send Relief to maintain training materials and to assist with ministry requests. In addition to ESL workshops,

the NLMP helps local churches share Jesus through Adult Reading and Writing, and Tutoring Children and Youth.

Claudean Boatman, NLMP coordinator, explains, "Each 12 hour fully live ESL Basic Workshop is led by a trainer who has been trained through the National Literacy Missions Partnership and the North American Mission Board/ Send Relief. The Basic Workshop equips local church volunteers to intentionally share the gospel with new English speakers."

Planting the seed of the gospel

T his year's SEA (Southeast Asia) mission team taught

English at four public schools in Thailand and led two English camps for students. For the English

team members picked stories out of the Bible and adapted them into English lessons. We had four teaching teams that taught four rotations of students for about 30-40 minutes each. Each team taught a different story of the Bible.

One team taught the story of Noah and the ark. They created a list of animals and taught the students how to pronounce the names of the animals. Then they played a game where the students drew an animal on a

piece of paper. Next, they folded the paper into an airplane and

put the animals on the ark by throwing the airplane at a picture of the ark on the board.

Another team taught the

story of Jesus feeding the 5,000. After telling the story, they asked the students what their favorite food was. Each student shared their favorite food in English.

In total, we planted the seed of the gospel in more than 300 students. As we were leaving each site, teachers and staff came up to tell us how much they want us to come back and to stay longer. Our local church partners also expressed gratitude to us for opening this

door of ministry into the community.

One of our team members even got to share the gospel with a female teacher. She had heard of Jesus before and wanted to know more about Christianity. Our team member gave her a copy of the New Testament in Thai. As he walked away, he looked back and saw the teacher with the book opened and looking through it already.

While the mission team had a very enjoyable time teaching students and playing with them during recess, the greatest reward was seeing five girls commit their lives to Christ at English camp. They had attended the previous year's camp and heard the gospel for the first time then. This year, they gave their hearts to Jesus. This was evidenced by the fact that they continued singing and praising God, even

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Wisconsin pastor cleared of abuse charges

Madison, Wis. (BP)

– A circuit court jury
cleared former Wisconsin pastor Robert Stine
of sexual abuse charges
on July 17.

Stine, 61, was pastor of Midvale Baptist Church in Madison, Wis., from 2007 until his resignation in June 2023, two months before he was indicted in August on two counts of sexual abuse against a minor.

Stine's attorney, Christopher Van Wagner, said, "We are grateful the jury looked closely at the evidence and reached the right decision."

Because of the charges, the Wisconsin Department of Children and Families revoked the license of the childcare center operating in the church's building. It is unknown if the revocation will be reversed.

Southern Baptist Hmong churches impact Hmong International Freedom Festival

St. Paul, Minn. (BP) - The Hmong International Freedom Festival, one of the largest gatherings in the world of the formerly agrarian people with roots in Laos, Vietnam and Thailand, takes place the weekend before the Fourth of July. And thanks to a strong Southern Baptist Hmong presence at this year's festival, dozens of attendees responded to the gospel.

Last year, 37,000 attended the event at the spacious Como Regional Park. This year, more than 57,000 were onsite to take advantage of sporting events, vendors and other resources

"I felt like God's plan was fulfilled," Mary Her told Baptist Press. She organized the first-ever joint praise and worship sessions at this year's festival. "The Lord parted the skies that weekend. It had been raining

almost every day for two weeks. A few days before the festival I prayed to God, 'Lord, You promised me the weather would be beautiful and that you would protect it from the rain and I trust that your will be done.'

"It rained Friday night. Saturday and Sunday were dry, and it rained again on Monday morning," said Her, a member at One in Christ Hmong Baptist Church in Hudson, Wis. "The Lord told me, 'I have gone before you, I will be with you and protect this [event],' and He was very present. He fulfilled His promises!"

Not unlike the Independence Day celebrations days later, the Hmongs celebrate freedom at the festival, Her said.

"Before we came to America as refugees, our people were supporting the Americans in fighting the war in Vietnam and the secret war in Laos," she said. "As a result we experienced oppression and genocide."

The idea for a joint praise and worship team came to Her at last year's event, where various Christian churches had a presence but were disjointed.

She said the Holy Spirit prompted her to bring the churches together in a show of unity.

"I prayed and I fasted for six months before I finally had the courage to fulfill God's calling for me," Her said. "In December I took Mee Vang, the president of the board of trustees of the International Hmong Freedom Festival, to lunch at a Chinese restaurant called Tea House in St. Paul. I shared my vision with her and she was very excited about it. She wanted it [the festival] to be inclusive because the Hmong community is very diverse."

Festival organizers agreed to allow the group two hours each day on the main stage.

"I literally had two months to organize the two, two-hour services and organize the Hmong Baptist National Association's display booth," Her said. "I prayed and fasted, and the Lord's hand was all over this. 'I am with you,' He would tell me. 'I have gone before you. Do not be discouraged.""

Her is the Women's Ministry Director for the Hmong National Baptist Association, and is a senior clinical supervisor for the Amherst Wilder Foundation's school-based mental health program that serves 30 schools in St. Paul. Fifteen years ago Her started the first culturally-specific, school-based, mental health program for Hmong children in the U.S.

"But I had never done anything like this before," Her said. "I prayed and fasted all year. After I got permission, I put together a steering committee of local Southern Baptist Hmong pastors and church members to plan these events to praise, honor and wor-

ship God, and to send a message of hope to the Hmong community."

She invited other evangelical Hmong churches to collaborate in the program, which included local church groups providing Hmong and English-language songs, with preaching done by Southern Baptist pastors: Pastor Vameng Pha from One In Christ **Hmong Baptist Church** in Hudson, Wis., and Pastor Tswvfwj Muasnumtuam from Cornerstone Hmong Baptist Church in Oakdale, Minn.

An internationally known and popular Hmong vocalist, KB Xiong, who lives in Georgia, also performed during the prime time midday services.

"I had so much joy over it," Her said.
"Many times our churches are so siloed we don't even know how to worship God together. Several people came up to me and said thank you for hosting this worship session, and many people who didn't know God would come and listen."

There's more.

In addition to the two services, five Hmong evangelical churches had their own display areas, including one by the several local Southern Baptist Hmong churches in metro St. Paul, which stretches to nearby Hudson, Wis. That booth focused on evangelism and prayer.

As a result, volunteers for the Hmong Baptist National Association helped lead 60 people–kids and adults–to come to faith in Jesus and to profess what Jesus did for them; 302 youngsters heard the Gospel presented by Hmong children and youth between the ages of 7 and 16.

Gideons International donated 2,100 pocket-sized new Testaments in English that about 60 volunteers—including Southern Baptists from Texas, Wisconsin and North Carolina—helped distribute. The Minnesota Wisconsin Baptist Con-

vention gave 55 full Bibles in English, which were passed on to those who made professions of faith.

Hundreds of people requested prayer.

"We had a lot of children come to ask for prayers for themselves and their parents, who they said are struggling," Her said. "Adults were asking for prayers for physical, mental and spiritual health as they deal with life. We also dedicated time on an open mic for anyone who wanted to sing songs of praise and worship at our display booth."

The Hmong International Freedom Festival's executive director has already expressed interest in a repeat event next year, Her said. The two women are to meet for lunch again in August to discuss the future of a concerted evangelical presence at the Hmong Freedom Festival.

"We had more than 57,000 people attend, 20,000 more than last year," Her said. "We were basically praising God amongst all those people. We had 60 people volunteer to help, with five Baptist, two Christian Missionary Alliance and two Assembly of God churches participating, and everybody who was involved was very thankful. It was a very powerful experience for them."
